

Principal's Report

Dear parents and friends of Les Powell School.

It is truly unbelievable at how fast this term has flown by and it's even more unbelievable that we are here at the start of spring, and looking forward to warmer days for the school holidays.

Whilst a number of staff and students succumbed to dreaded flues and colds, we still managed to pack a lot of fantastic learning activities with lots of opportunities to celebrate.



We started Term 3 with a school assembly to celebrate NAIDOC week.

In Week 2, staff, students and visiting families weathered a very windy morning, but still managed to get silly by dressing up to jointly commemorate Education and Book Week.







We continued our celebrations as we acknowledged Gina Wheeler for her 20 years of teaching with the Department of Education. I was delighted to present Gina with a certificate of acknowledgement from the department, for her dedication and service to education.



I could not have been more proud of our students who did an outstanding job of catering a parent morning tea, early in the term. Updates and changes:

Parents, who have come to the school in the last two weeks, may have been inclined to think that we had been vandalised by colour coordinated vandals. In fact it was staff who wanted to trial the winning colours for our new look front of school and foyer. I would like to thank the parents and staff who contributed ideas towards our new colour scheme. Consensus from all and especially

from students, has indicated that grey is the new colour of choice. Painting will be completed for the two main areas during this coming school holiday.

We are also waiting on further quotes to finalise plans for an all-weather cola style cover to the top playground. I hope that this will not only allow for students to access play areas when raining, but will also allow us to conduct weekly assemblies.

This term, the department launched the A-Z Policy Implementation Tool (AZT) that provides a process for schools to follow when monitoring the implementation of policy, starting with the School Attendance Policy, Student Discipline in Government Schools Policy, Protecting and Supporting Children and Young People Policy and the Working with Children Check Policy. At Les Powell, we are using this as an opportunity to review all our implementation plans and procedures for these policies and also include others that are more specific to our school such as the Manual Handling and Hydrotherapy Pool procedures, to name two. I will be sharing more information, updates and seeking your input in relation to a number of these documents in the coming months.

Early next term, I will be forwarding you a draft copy of our Student Wellbeing and Discipline implementation plan and a draft copy of our Student Attendance implementation plan for your feedback. As part of this process, I have attached two parent information sheets regarding student attendance. Regular attendance at school is essential to assist students to maximise their potential. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students. 


Class 4C






Class 11C

This term has been a very busy one for both parents and staff. On behalf of the parents and wider community I'd like to warmly welcome our new Relieving Principal, Sandra Acedevo-Rugg. Sandra has some great new ideas for Les Powell School and we look forward to being involved.

This term has been a very busy term for the parent community with the introduction of our parent support group. We have had two such group meetings this term which were very well attended. Morning tea was supplied and served by the hospitality students of 8G. Parents were very surprised at just how professional our students were. These sessions were a great opportunity to discuss your concerns about health issues, NDIS and general issues involved with raising a child with special needs. We plan to continue our parent support meetings on a monthly basis and look forward to seeing more parents as we grow in strength. We have also had a few informative workshops for parents on Communication and Nutrition. Raymond Lee, Speech Therapist ran workshops for parents explaining how our "in school" speech program was running and also on what parents can do at home to continue the program to alleviate frustration for both the children and the carers.

Our program on "Fruit n Veg Sense" was run by the Cancer Council of NSW and was designed to help parents with fussy eaters and to tie in with the school curriculum on Healthy Eating. This was also very well attended and participants left with a free cook book.

Parents also had the opportunity to enjoy a meal at The Restaurant Macarthur at Campbelltown TAFE and Classics Bistro at Mounties as part of our "Parents Day Out" program. These lunches are a chance to get to know other parents at the school and to enjoy a little "ME TIME". We all know that we need that at some point.

I was fortunate enough to obtain an Environmental Sustainability Gant through Liverpool City Council of \$5,000.00. These funds were used to install a water storage tank and sprinkler system in the Vegetable Garden behind the pool.
